

Why Community Based Assessments are an Important Tool for Work Access for Clients with Brain Injury

These are non-paid job tryouts with which be set up within the private sector for up to 215 hours for people with a disability (US Department of Labor Waiver, 1993) The tryouts can be based upon the individual's goal and we can learn if any accommodations that may be needed for job success.

Also, importantly, many of these job tryouts transition to paid work with the employer receiving a tax credit and assured the job be performed proficiently.

A brain injury can leave an individual with minor to significant impairments that interfere with finding and keeping a job. These impairments can range from cognitive, physical, emotional, or behavioral.

There are more than 5.3 million individuals in the United States who are living with a permanent brain injury-related disability. That's one in every 60 people. At least 2.8 million Americans sustain traumatic brain injuries in the United States every year. (Source: National statistics from the Brain Injury Association of America)

About Brain Injury (from the Brain Injury Association of America)

An acquired brain injury (ABI) is an injury to the brain that is not hereditary, congenital, degenerative, or induced by birth trauma. Essentially, this type of brain injury is one that has occurred after birth. There are two types of acquired brain injury: traumatic and non-traumatic.

A traumatic brain injury (TBI) is defined as an alteration in brain function, or other evidence of brain pathology, caused by an external force or trauma. Traumatic impact injuries can be defined as closed (or non-penetrating) or open (penetrating).

Last year, 22% of NVSU clients served were people with a brain injury, doubling from 11.5 % in 2021. We worked with our brain injury clients on Community Based Assessments-(which can occur in the private or public sector, designed to allow the client to begin working part-time with gradual increases in participation as their stamina, endurance and tolerance for work increases) at Walgreens in Auburn and Northgate, Habitat for Humanity in Lynnwood, Cady Cremation Services and Funeral Home in Kent, and Glassybaby.

Thanks to the employers mentioned above and to DVR for funding services to support NVSU clients affected by brain injury.
